


Figure 1: Objectives and Strategies for Achievement

G. University Values

Translate the core focus of university teaching into university branding related to wetland environments, Pancasila and Citizenship Education curriculum comparable to how a program in the field of education directs research focus on social and cultural community values for the development of reflective citizenship pedagogy. Thus, the primary focus of research aimed at educational programs is in the fields of education, social sciences, culture, and humanity. To support the achievement of research excellence in educational program development, main research topics are grouped into two primary areas: education and non-education. Field research topics in education include (1) education and training, (2) citizenship studies, and (3) appropriate social education. Next are non-education research topics, including (1) social sciences, culture, humanities, and sociology, (2) law, and (3) political studies.

Core values (*university values*) form the foundation for achieving the above research focus, inspired by the values of the Banjar community in South Kalimantan, namely "waja hingga kaputing" (remaining steadfast and strong like steel from beginning to end). These core values have been adopted by the Pancasila and Citizenship Education Curriculum in its implementation. Postgraduate training in worldview is aimed at shaping the character of students in accordance with the noble values of the Banjar community's struggle.

H. History

Based on the history of the development of Lambung Mangkurat University (ULM), the of Pancasila Education and Citizenship Studies (PPKn) at the Faculty of Teacher Training and Education (FKIP) ULM is a continuation of the Civics and Law Program at the Faculty of Education (FKg) ULM, established in 1964. On December 8, 1983, the Faculty of Education (FKg) was merged with the Faculty of Education Sciences (FIP) to form the Faculty of Education and Education Sciences (FKIP) ULM, and the Civics Law Program was renamed the Pancasila and Citizenship Education Program (PPKn). The PPKn program was accredited by the National Accreditation Board (BAN) through Decision No. 013/BAN-PT/Ak-XV/S1/VI/2012 with a grade of B (Good) or a score of 3.17. In line with the demands and changes in the vision and mission of ULM and FKIP, it is imperative for the PPKn Study Program to revise its vision, mission, objectives, and goals. The formulation of the vision, mission, objectives, and goals of the PPKn Study Program at FKIP ULM is as follows:

- 1. On June 12, 2015, a department meeting was held in preparation for the admission of new students. The meeting, attended by faculty members of the PPKN program, resulted in a consensus to revise the vision, mission, objectives, and goals of the PPKN program at FKIP ULM.
- 2. Next, on August 6, 2015, a meeting of PPKn Study Program lecturers was held to prepare the accreditation form. Specifically regarding Standard 1, the establishment of the Vision, Mission, Objectives, and Goals (VMTS) of the PPKn Program at the Faculty of Education and Teacher Training (FKIP) of ULM was directly chaired by the Program Coordinator of PPKn FKIP ULM. Since the VMTS serves as the foundation for the program's work plan, it was deemed necessary to conduct a workshop involving all stakeholders related to the PPKn Program at FKIP ULM. Prior to the workshop, a faculty meeting of the PPKn Program at FKIP ULM was held to prepare the workshop materials, particularly regarding the vision, mission, objectives, and goals of the PPKn Program at FKIP ULM.
- 3. On December 22–23, 2015, a workshop was held on the vision, mission, objectives, and goals of the PPKn Study Program and the integration of ULM's vision and mission into the course "" of the PPKn Study Program at FKIP ULM. The workshop was attended by representatives

- of student cohorts, the IKA PPKn Program Committee, parents of students, the Education Office, the UPM FKIP ULM, and faculty leadership.
- 4. To concretize the workshop outcomes regarding the vision, mission, objectives, and goals of the PPKn Program, a faculty meeting was held on January 28, 2016.
- 5. To gather input on the understanding of students and alumni within the PPKn Program, a survey on testimonials regarding the vision, mission, objectives, and goals of the PPKn Program at FKIP ULM was distributed on March 23-24, 2016. The survey results indicated that students' understanding was adequate, while alumni's understanding still required further socialization.

I. Organization




Figure 2. Organizational Structure of the PPKn Undergraduate Program.

The structure and organization of the PPKn Study Program at FKIP ULM, based on Government Regulation No. 60 of 1999, consist of leadership, lecturers, and students. The study program is led by the Program Coordinator (Korprodi), assisted by a secretary, treasurer, laboratory manager, journal editor, and educational staff. The organizational structure is illustrated in Figure 2 below:

J. Educational Facilities

The Bachelor's Degree Program in Pancasila and Citizenship Education is equipped with facilities including classrooms, laboratories, faculty/administrative offices, a multimedia room, a library with journal access, and supporting facilities such as restrooms, a prayer room, and an open green space.

K. Curriculum of the Bachelor's Degree Program in Pancasila and Citizenship Education

Ministry of Education and Culture Regulation of the Republic of Indonesia Number 3 of 2020 on SN-Higher Education Article 10 Paragraph 1 states that learning process standards are the minimum criteria for the implementation of learning processes in study programs to achieve

graduate learning outcomes. Paragraph 2 further states that the learning process includes characteristics such as interactive, holistic, integrative, scientific, contextual, thematic, effective, collaborative, and student-centered.

Learning is conducted based on the premise that learning in a course occurs through stages of learning to achieve measurable, systematic, and planned student competencies. Learning analysis is conducted to identify final competencies at each learning stage (Sub-CPMK) as a breakdown of the CPMK. There are four types of Sub-CPMK structures that indicate the learning stages in a course: hierarchical structure, procedural structure, cluster structure, and combination structure.


Interactive learning is a learning process that emphasizes two-way interaction between lecturers and students and among students. Interactive characteristics can be seen through the design of activities in the semester learning plan (RPS) which includes two-way learning patterns, such as discussion activities, question and answer sessions, or student work demonstrations. Furthermore, holistic learning is a process that encourages the development of comprehensive and broad thinking by internalizing local and national strengths and wisdom. Holistic characteristics can be seen in the curriculum and learning activities that are designed considering cognitive, affective, and psychomotor aspects, reflected in the description of graduate learning outcomes (CPL) which are derived in course learning outcomes (CPMK) and Sub-CPMK contained in each RPS. Furthermore, learning must be conducted in an integrated manner to fulfill the CPL within a single program. This ensures that learning outcomes not only cover students' understanding but also various other competencies, including critical, analytical, chronological, and systematic thinking skills. Additionally, the achievement of attitude and skill aspects is an integral part of the CPL assigned to almost all courses.

Scientific learning is learning that prioritizes a scientific approach so that an academic environment based on the values, norms, and principles of science is created, while upholding religious and national values. To fulfill the elements of scientific learning, the study program designs a course structure in semesters 5-7 that allows for course assignments in the form of final projects or scientific articles for publication. This is done so that students can apply the concepts and theories they have learned in semesters 1-4. The impact of this includes the publication of scientific articles by students in national journals, accredited national journals, and even international journals. Furthermore, contextual learning involves adapting the learning process to the demands of problem-solving within the field of knowledge and expertise. The contextual characteristics are fulfilled in the course

history courses through the adoption and innovation of learning designs used in schools, particularly partner schools where teaching practice takes place. Best practices from these schools are used as case studies in courses on learning strategies and evaluation, educational innovation, and several other courses.

The final learning characteristic is student-centered, meaning that the learning process prioritizes the development of students' creativity, capacity, personality, and needs, as well as developing their independence in seeking and discovering knowledge. This characteristic is reflected in the selection of learning models such as Project-Based Learning (PjBL), Case-Based Method, Problem-Based Learning (PBL), and other models that enable

The forms and methods of learning are based on the necessity that the expected competencies have been established in a learning stage in accordance with the CPL. The forms of learning are:

lectures, responses, tutorials, seminars or equivalent, practicums, studio practice, field practice, research, community building/thematic student exchange, internships/work practice, teaching assistance, humanitarian projects, entrepreneurial activities, independent studies/projects, and/or other equivalent forms of learning. Meanwhile, *blended learning* methods include: group discussions, simulations, case studies, collaborative learning, cooperative learning, project-based learning, problem-based learning, or other learning methods that can effectively facilitate the achievement of graduate learning outcomes. Learning methods are expected to use the Case Method and Project-Based Learning. The following is an explanation of the Case Method and Project-Based Learning.

The determination of courses and the number of credit hours is based on the breadth (amount of study material) and depth (Bloom's taxonomy level) indicated by the weight of the course relative to the total weight that must be completed. The Civic Education Study Program sets a minimum number of credit hours that must be completed by students to graduate at **144 credit hours** from a total of 157 credit hours offered. The distribution of courses offered by the program consists of 55 required courses and 12 elective courses.
